





The MOL Charitable Trust is an initiative of Mitsui O.S.K. Lines Ltd (MOL), a multimodal transport company in Japan. The company was founded in 1964 through the merger of OSK Lines and Mitsui Lines. Today, the MOL Group is one of the largest shipping companies in the world, as well as one of the three largest Japanese shipping companies.

s part of its benevolent and philanthropic actions to support the Mauritian population and participate in the safeguarding of the local environment, the MOL Group has sent numerous teams of experts to the island to contribute to the efforts to support the local communities and contribute to the restoration of the natural environment. In September 2020, the company decided to allocate 800 million yen to support the affected people and environment in Mauritius.

In October 2020, the company registered a local branch, MOL (Mauritius) Ltd, to better coordinate its efforts in Mauritius. Having realised that a Trust would better serve this purpose, the MOL Charitable Trust, was then established on 21st June 2021. MOL (Mauritius) Ltd will continue to operate, however, with a mission to inspect potential investment and business opportunities in Mauritius. The Trust has a fund of 300 million yen, released by the MOL Group, to accomplish its purpose in Mauritius. The remaining 500 million yen will be made available to the MOL Japanese Foundation. The objectives of the MOL Charitable Trust are to support vulnerable communities and assist projects aimed at restoring, conserving and safeguarding nature.

The Trust is managed by 7 Enforcers, including 4 Local Enforcers who are based in Mauritius and has an approximate annual funding of 50 million yen for the next 5 to 6 years.

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The mission of the MOL Charitable Trust in Mauritius is composed of 10 priority goals. Each of these objectives responds to at least one of the Sustainable Development Goals for the future of humanity established by the United Nations.

Conservation and development of mangrove forests

Mangroves play an important role in the conservation of natural coastal areas. They help to combat erosion and serve as a nursery for many species that inhabit the lagoons. Our goal is to support conservation of existing mangrove forests and to help planting new ones.
